



UNACCOMPANIED MINORS POLICY

United States

Certain airlines enforce stringent policies when determining the age at which they consider passengers too young to travel unaccompanied. Below is an outline of the policies implemented by major airlines.

United Airlines and American Airlines do not allow unaccompanied minors on connecting flights, and their unaccompanied minor service is required for children aged 5-14, with the option available for those aged 15-17. The airlines do not permit unaccompanied minors on connecting flights or flights operated by partner airlines or codeshare flights.

In the case of **Delta Airlines**, the unaccompanied minor service remains mandatory for children aged 5-14. However, children aged 8-14 are permitted to travel on both nonstop and connecting flights, but only with specific airlines, namely Delta, Delta Connection, KLM, and Air France.

In addition to the airline's unaccompanied minor fees, PLUS will also incur extra expenses. These include the cost of assigning a staff member to accompany the minor at the airport, waiting until their departure, and then arranging for the staff member's return journey. This results in an additional fee beyond what is charged by the airline for the unaccompanied minor service.
